Course for Assistant Leader Trainers 27 April-3 May, Cambodia This endeavor is the Boy Scouts of the Philippines' (BSP) response to the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Plan (NDRRMP) 2011-2028 with the end in view to address the need to make the most number of citizens better equipped in dealing with disaster, calamities and emergencies by imparting to them the necessary knowledge and skills on how to mitigate, reduce and manage its risks.

The five-day training course were both theoretical and practical in nature. Written exams were given to gauge the learners' conceptual aptitude abilities while simulation exercises in relation to disaster and emergency were done from simple to complex scenarios like Basic Life Support, Vehicle Extrication, Sweep Water Rescue, Collapse Structure Search/Rescue and Incident Command System through the Mass Casualty Incident scenario as the culminating activity with 15 victims.

This project was made possible through the support of the World Scout Foundation (WSF) and His Majesty King Carl Gustaf of Sweden during his visit to the Philippines in early 2014. The project implementation was a collaborative effort between the BSP headed by Mr. Cedric Train, BSP National Program Commissioner and Mr. Syd Castillo, Director for Youth Program, Asia-Pacific Regional Office. They were ably assisted by Mr. Broderick Train, a Professional Disaster Management expert and a good number of trained volunteers in the field. --- Mar A. Young adult leaders trained in Macau

Ten years after the Scout Association of Macau (SAM) organized the first Course for Assistant Leader Trainers (CALT) in 2005, a new batch of leaders were trained from 4 to 8 April 2015 at the national headquarters in Taipa. There were 37 participants comprised of 27 local and 10 overseas from Hong Kong and Malaysia. The course was conducted in Chinese language and Cantonese.

Course Director was Linda Chou, Deputy Chief Commissioner of SAM, supported by Francisco Chan, Training Commissioner, and Ronald Leng, Assistant Training Commissioner. Overseas trainers were Dr Mak Wai Meng (Hong Kong), Peter Lee (Hong Kong), Dr Leonides Son (Philippines) and Thian Hong Boon (APR office).

World Day Against Child Labour 2015 NO to child labour, YES to quality education!

Between 2000 and 2012, the number of children in child labour fell by one third. Yet there are still 168 million children in child labour, of whom 85 million are engaged in hazardous work. While significant progress has been made, much remains to be done to eradicate the problem. On World Day Against Child Labour each year, global, national and local partners in the worldwide movement against child labour come together to demand an end to child labour and the realization of children's rights to learn, play and grow in a healthy and safe environment.

For over a decade now, the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) and the International Programme on the Elimination of Child Labour (IPEC) of the International Labour Organization (ILO) have been collaborating to raise awareness about issues of social justice and human rights including, in particular, about child labour.

WOSM and ILO-IPEC are once again calling on National Scout Organizations (NSOs) and ILO Country Offices to join forces in activities and events planned on and around the World Day Against Child Labour on 12 June.

The focus of the World Day this year is on free, compulsory, quality education as the means to make the single biggest difference in combating child labour. It has even greater impact when combined with policies promoting better livelihoods, social protection and law enforcement. On this World Day, we call for:

- free, compulsory and quality education for all children at least until the minimum age for work;
- action to reach those presently in child labour;
- further efforts to improve the impact of national policies on child labour;
- policies that ensure children's access to quality education and that enhance investment in the teaching profession.

Within its own initiatives, WOSM can extend its Keeping Scouts Safe From Harm policy, training, procedures and good practices throughout the Movement, especially to vulnerable children engaged in Scout programmes. It can also take advantage of more extensive use of World Scout programmes, especially its flagship initiative, Messengers of Peace, and the Scouts of the World Award, to expand the capacity of Scouts to reach out to children in difficult circumstances through regional, national and local projects around the world.

Scout saves 9-year old boy in Maldives

On 10th April 2015, 9-year old Ahmed Shaiban was saved by Scout Ahmed Azuhad and his friend Mohamed Musrih. The incident happened at Baa Atoll Eydhafushi Island, where Shaiban was reported to have slipped from the jetty while taking a stroll alone.

Scout Azuhad said he saw a boy floating in the sea without any movement, so he jumped in along with his friend Mohamed Musrih. While he pulled the kid onto a nearby boat and administered first aid, his friend went to gather people for help.

Trees for the World

Scouts of China (Taiwan) has organized countrywide tree planting event in March, involving 2,200 Scouts from 12 Scout councils in Taiwan that planted 20,000 trees. A rover crew also organized their own tree planting event in an offshore island.

Around 100 to 700 Scouts participated from each council -- a 275% growth from last year of 800 Scouts.

Scouts mourn the loss of Singapore's founding Prime Minister Mr Lee Kuan Yew. Mr Lee was a Scout in the 32nd Singapore Scout Troop, which later became the 01 Raffles Scout Group. He was Singapore's first Prime Minister, serving from 1959 to 1990 and continued contributing to Singapore in various official capacities until he passed away on 23 March 2015.
